What exactly do my EyeMed benefits cover?

Your vision benefits provide coverage for you and your eligible dependents for prescription eyeglass lenses and frames, prescription contact lenses, and vision exams, as well as discounts on additional products and services. If you choose an in-network provider, your benefits include:

- Yearly exam at no cost to you
- Yearly frame allowance of \$120
- Yearly lens benefit of either:
 - Contact lenses allowance of \$130, or
 - Standard eyeglass lenses with a \$25 copay (progressive lenses and other premium lens options available with an increased copay)
- No reimbursement filing
- Additional discounts available

For more details about your in-network benefits as well as the out-of-network benefits also available, create a member account on Member Web at eyemed.com/member or download the EyeMed App. You can also call Alliance's Member Services at (855) 979-5192 with questions. (No changes have been made to the prescription safety glasses benefit, which is administered by local HR rather than EyeMed.)

How do I find an eye doctor in my network and start using my benefits?

Your EyeMed packet (arriving to your home address) lists some of the in-network providers in your area, but you can also search the full directory using EyeMed's online tools.

Visit eyemed.com/member or download the EyeMed App, click "Find an eye doctor," and choose the "Insight Network." Filter your search to look for an eye doctor near you with brands, hours, and services you want.

After choosing an in-network eye doctor, contact them to schedule your visit for care or eyewear.

Can I use EyeMed benefits online?

You can use your in-network benefits online (at checkout) with these participating providers: lenscrafters.com, targetoptical.com, ray-ban.com, glasses.com, and contactsdirect.com.

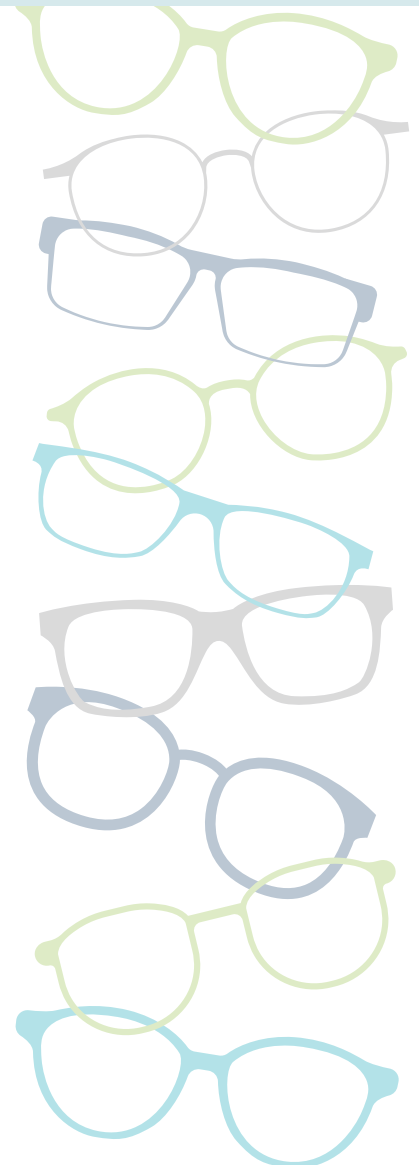
Enjoy free shipping, free returns, and no paperwork with these online providers.

Can I get the same kind of care with a retail provider as I can with an independent eye doctor?

You'll receive many of the same services at a retail provider (like LensCrafters) or at an independent eye doctor office. EyeMed verifies the credentials of every in-network eye doctor, so you can feel confident you're getting access to qualified eye doctors.

"Allowance" means the amount of money EyeMed provides toward your purchase of frames or contact lenses. For example, if you have a \$120 allowance for frames and you purchase frames that cost \$150, you pay only \$30 out-of-pocket.

"Copay" means a fixed amount that you pay out-of-pocket at the time of your visit. For example, if you purchase standard eyeglass lenses, you pay only a \$25 copay and EyeMed pays the rest.



Does EyeMed offer any extra discounts?

At participating in-network providers, you'll receive:

- 40% off an extra pair of eyeglasses or 20% off a partial pair (lenses only or frames only).*
- 20% off non-prescription sunglasses and accessories.
- Discounts on LASIK laser vision correction.

How do I get on-the-go access?

With the EyeMed App you can find an eye doctor, set an appointment, review your benefits, estimate costs, show your ID card, store your vision prescriptions, and even set exam reminders.

How do I submit a claim?

With an in-network eye doctor, you'll save money and you won't have to submit a claim. With an out-of-network eye doctor, you'll have to submit a claim to EyeMed. If you need an out-of-network claim form, log into your Member Web account and go to the "Claims" tab.

How do I get an ID card replacement or extra cards?

If you lose your card or need extras for your family, log into your account to print a replacement or to access your ID card digitally, or use your phone to take a picture of your card and share with family members. (Here's a tip: you don't even need the card when you visit your eye doctor – just provide your name, date of birth, and photo ID.)

I don't wear glasses and can see fine. Do I still need an eye exam?

Getting an eye exam isn't just about needing glasses. It's also about your health. An eye exam can detect eye health problems like glaucoma or cataracts, and help identify early signs of other health conditions, like high blood pressure, diabetes, and high cholesterol.¹

How often should I get an eye exam?

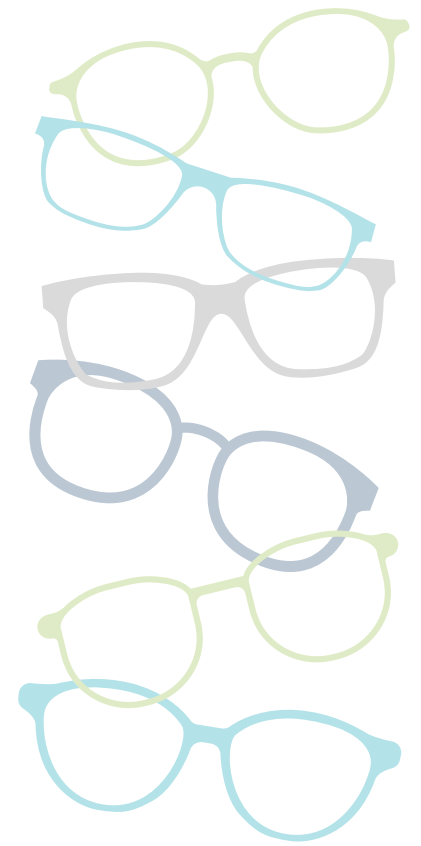
Vision changes can happen slowly — you may not even notice it. A good general rule is to get an eye exam yearly unless your eye doctor suggests more frequent exams.

At what age should my child first visit the eye doctor?

Eye exams are recommended at the following ages: newborn (check for basic indicators of eye health), 6-12 months (check for healthy eye alignment and movement), 3-5 years (general eye exam), 6 years through adulthood (yearly eye exam).²

My child gets a vision screening at school, so there's no need for an eye exam, right?

A vision screening does not take the place of a comprehensive eye exam. School screenings generally check for color blindness and your child's ability to see far away. A comprehensive exam will evaluate the entire structure of the eye.
